**“A MOMENT IN TIME: THE REHABILITATION OF ROCHESTER’S
FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT DESIGNED BOYNTON HOUSE”
PRESENTATION SET FOR NOVEMBER 14**

ROCHESTER, NY Oct 30, 2013 — The rehabilitation of the Boynton House, the only home in Rochester designed by America’s most famous architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, is the topic of a presentation set for Thursday November, 14 at 7 p.m. at the Memorial Art Gallery Auditorium, 500 University Ave., Rochester.

“A Moment in Time” will be presented by John Page, Bero Architecture PLLC who will show photos and walk through the rehabilitation process of this historic home in Rochester. Purchased by Jane Parker and Fran Cosentino in 2009, the home is an unusually fine example of what Wright called his Prairie Style, innovative designs of his early years that influenced twentieth century architecture.

The event is free with admission to the Memorial Art Gallery and free for members of the Memorial Art Gallery and The Landmark Society. The event is sponsored by The Landmark Society of Western New York, Bero Architecture PLLC and the Memorial Art Gallery.

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Edward Boynton, a Rochester businessman, commissioned Frank Lloyd Wright to design the house as a residence for him and his daughter, Beulah. Completed in 1908, it included a landscaped garden and a set of tennis courts on land that stretched almost to Park Avenue.

The Boynton House is one of the few privately owned Wright houses to retain original furnishings designed by Wright. The furnishings were also restored as part of the rehabilitation project by The Landmark Society of Western New York. The Landmark Society owns the 17 remaining pieces, including 15 pieces of the original dining room furniture, and has historically partnered with owners to keep the furniture in its original setting.
